Sacrament of Communion

At Plymouth Church, we celebrate the sacrament of communion on the first Sunday of the month. We believe that the communion table is the largest table in the world, and everyone is welcome. We practice an open table, where the only requirement to share in the sacramental meal is a hunger for the gifts offered by Jesus Christ. All ages are welcome to receive the sacrament, and parents/guardians are welcome to discern their children's participation. It is not necessary to be a member of this congregation or to be a baptized Christian to participate. Communion is served with grape juice, and gluten-free bread is available. Those who do not wish to receive communion may still come forward to receive a blessing from the minister, or to remain in your seat.

Families with Children

Children of all ages are always welcome at Plymouth! We offer many programs and events throughout the year to foster faith development in children and fellowship among our families. We strive to make worship family-friendly and to provide support to families while attending church by offering Busy Bags, Children's Worship Bulletins, a comfort room with toys and a changing table, and a Children's Worship Space with quiet activities. Professionally-staffed childcare for kids 4 and under is available every Sunday from 9am-12pm on the second floor. Sunday School for kids Pre-K to 8th grade takes place during worship, except for on the first Sunday of the month when there is no Sunday School to encourage families to worship together and receive communion.

Large print bulletins and hearing enhancement devices are available. Please ask an usher.


Voluntary O Morning Star, How Clear and BrightMax Drischner George A. Sargeant, organ

MUSIC NOTES

Twentieth-century French organist and composer Maurice Duruflé studied organ with Charles Tournemire. He became titular organist of St. Etienne-du-Mont in Paris in 1930, a position he held until his death. Eight years later, he became professor of harmony at the Conservatoire de Paris, where he worked until 1970. His compositional output was small compared to his contemporaries, due largely to the very high standards he set for himself. His *Prelude sur l'Introit de l'Épiphanie (Prelude on the Introit for Epiphany)* is a short meditation that takes as its subject the plainchant sung at the entrance of the priest at Mass on the Feast of the Epiphany.

Healey Willan was born in England in 1880 and emigrated to Canada in 1913. He settled in Toronto and served first music director of St. Paul's Church, Bloor Street, and later and more famously at the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, where he stayed until shortly before his death in 1968. He also taught music theory at Toronto's Royal Conservatory of Music. *Arise, Shine, for Thy Light is Come* was commissioned by and dedicated to the choir of Resurrection Lutheran Church in Sappington, Missouri and dates from 1956.

Frédéric Chopin's Opus 15 Nocturnes are a set of three pieces for solo piano written between 1830 and 1833. They display a more personal approach to the nocturne form than that of the earlier Opus 9. The melodies and emotional depth of these nocturnes have thus been thought of as more "Chopinesque." Op. 15, No. 2 follows ternary form. The first section, marked *Larghetto*, features an intricate, elaborately ornamental melody. The second section, labeled *doppio movimento* (double speed), resembles a scherzo. The final section is a shortened version of the first (14 bars rather than 24) with characteristic cadenzas and elaboration, finishing with an arpeggio on F# major, falling at first, then dying away.

Max Drischner was an early leader in the organ reform movement and Baroque revival in Europe, and his music hearkens back to that earlier time rather than following more modern trends. His teachers included the famed harpsichordist Wanda Landowska. Though never a pupil, he also had several opportunities to meet and have his thinking shaped by Bach scholar and humanitarian Albert Schweitzer. The turmoil in Europe through the mid 20th century kept him from settling down and holding a single position for any length of time. His setting of *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern (O Morning Star, How Clear and Bright*) treats the melody of this Reformation-era Epiphany hymn sectionally, with each phrase serving as the basis for a brief fughetta.
